Do not plant this in your yard!

Phormium tenax







This New Zealand native was introduced to Hawai'i in the late 1800's as an ornamental. This plant is present in landscaped areas.

A single flower stalk can produce up to 10,000 seeds which are winged and dispersed by the wind.

Description:

An evergreen, perennial monocot that can grow up to 13' tall and 7' wide. Plant can be fertilized by its own pollen. This plant produces clones, which sprout up and spread out.

Flower:

Red or yellow tubular flowers that arise in bunches extending up to 12'.

Leaves:

Smooth, leathery, sword-shaped leaves that grow clumped in a fan shape. Leaf color can range from bright green to bronze and purple.

Fruit:

The fruit is a 3-angled capsule up to 4" long, containing many small wind-dispersed seeds.

Impacts and Harm:

- Seeds are wind dispersed
- Forms dense thickets
- Crowds out native vegetation and blocks the sunlight.
- Plants can root on the ground, in hapu'u trunks, open pig disturbed grassland, and steep ridges.
- Very tough to remove from the landscape once established.
